# 10 Reasons To Attend Worship in 2024

- 1. Worship forms us weekly. It wasn't until I was required to go to worship weekly as a pastor that I discovered what God can do through the weekly practice of worship. Bit by bit, worship forms us as Christians. It grows our ability to confess shortcomings, trust God, and get caught up in something larger than ourselves. You don't have to understand it all. You don't have to agree with it all, but week by week it will shape you for the better.
- 2. Always room for more hypocrites. Some critique the church by saying, "It's full of people who don't live up to what they believe." To that, I say, "Uh, duh!" We're the



first to admit we don't live up to the call of the gospel. That's why we confess our sins every week. Your failures, your messes, and your hypocrisy are released here. The world insists that we wrap ourselves in the veneer of accomplishment and success. The church invites you to come on in and be wrapped in grace.

3. Write it on your heart. I have no doubt that my phone has made me dumber. I expect that AI will do more of the same. When infinite information is accessible at our fingertips, we no longer have reason to store things in our brains. Yet when we are in crisis, google will not help us. We need God's word and wisdom written on our hearts. In weekly worship, we repeat scriptures, songs, and prayers so that they migrate from our heads to our hearts. They'll be ready for us when we need them most.

- 4. Community not of your choosing. With the internet and increased social mobility, you can curate who you are around with razor-sharp precision. Church ain't that place! Church is a community of very different people, all drawn to the same Lord week by week. Church is one of the last places in our society where you can regularly be in relationships with people different from you. It's good for your soul. It's good for our society.
- 5. Sing-alongs are fun. I'm in the Disney parenting stage. That means our house has become sing-along-central. I am a terrible singer. I genuinely do not know what pitch is. But singing, even terribly, is a blast. Singing communally is a means of sharing emotions with others—joy, lament, gratitude. Sing-alongs open the spirit. Worship is a weekly sing-along to the one who created music.
- 6. Your momma. When you come to church, people genuinely seek to know something authentic about who you are. If you're struggling, if your family is struggling, people will genuinely care and pray for you. Church is one

of the only places where acquaintances will ask about your momma, truly care about the answer, and bring you a casserole later.

- 7. Live is living! In worship, you get to hear free live music. Live music contains a beauty and mystery unparalleled by prerecorded music. These people are coming together to create something beautiful in your midst. It has never sounded this way before, it will never sound this way again. You are present for the moment of creation. What a wonder!
- 8. Tap into reality. Staying on the couch in jammies with a cup of warm coffee is tempting on a Sunday morning. But week by week, we confess that there is a reality beyond what we can see—God. We confess that the universe is not meaningless material but a beautiful cosmos created by God for love and redemption. Everything we do in worship taps into this bigger reality. The couch, the soccer pitch, and the vacation home are nice, but they'll never be as real as this.
- 9. It's not about you. Most messages in our culture are inward-facing. Your life is a movie; you are the lead character, and you better have a story worth watching. But your life is not a movie. You are not the lead character. Worship frees us from the constant pressure to be the lead because it reminds us that there are people and communities beyond ourselves. Worship is about a community of people gathering to speak and sing a shared story that is beyond them. We can just be beloved children worshipping the one who gives life, sustains our world, and saves us from ourselves.
- 10. It's about God. God is our creator. Without God, nothing, nothing, would exist. God created us. Saves us. Sustains us. Draws close to us in suffering. Holds our lives. Promises us a future. At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bend, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord! —-Pastor Lara Muser Gritter

## Sanctuary Waterproofing Project Progressing Well

The major waterproofing project on our sanctuary building is well underway and making good progress. Beginning back on November 1, the contractor, R&L Glover Enterprises, under the supervision of Bryce Evans, has been excavating down some 20 feet all around the exterior of the church building to repair and replace waterproofing materials.

The total budget for the extensive work is about \$580,000, which is being funded by our Church Maintenance Reserve fund.

The process also includes replacing the courtyard steps to the sanctuary as well as rebuilding the elevated porch on the Innes Street side. Completion of the work is scheduled for some time in March 2024. One setback was the discovery of asbestos in the original waterproofing material on the foundation walls, which may extend the project by several weeks. The asbestos must be professionally removed and disposed of by an asbestos abatement company.

The project is being monitored by our Facilitate committee leadership, our maintenance supervisor Archie Tucker and our architects, Ramsey and Burgin.

The Facilitate committee is grateful to our congregation and church staff for their patience during this lengthy process. It is a short-term inconvenience, but the long-term benefits will ensure the integrity of our beloved sanctuary building for years to come.

# The Courage to See

"It has seemed to me sometimes as though the Lord breathes on this poor gray ember of Creation and turns it to radiance—for a moment or a year or the span of a life."

Marilynne Robinson, Gilead

The Courage to See begins with these sparkling words from Marilynne Robinson. It is a powerful first step for a book of daily inspiration gleaned from some of the world's greatest literature. In the first few days of the New Year you encounter quotes from A River Runs Through It, Ecclesiastes, Ernest Hemingway, and Rainer Maria Rilke:

"My eyes already touch the sunny hill/going far ahead of the road I have begun. So we are grasped by what we cannot grasp; it has inner light, even from a distance..." Rilke

The foreword invites us to a bit of nostalgia as Sabrina Fountain acknowledges her preference for physical books and remembers as a child surrounding herself with her favorite volumes in bed the way most children are surrounded by their stuffed animals. But the direction of the devotions is engaging and even transformative. We are reminded that the God who created the world by calling things into existence is still calling us to exist in God's world.

"This is a profound and radical seeing, taking all of our courage to embrace" what God may be calling us to see and do in the New Year. Which is, after all, the point. Are we open to the Word that became flesh and dwelt among us? Do we have the courage to see and have our vision changed in the New Year?

If you are intrigued, The Courage to See may be just the reading companion you are looking for in the New Year. You may see old friends. You may make new ones. If you have the courage to read. Happy New Year! I hope to see you in church.



## Lifetime Planning (Financial, Health, & Estate) You are NEVER too young to plan!

Join Attorney Jennifer Flynn on Sunday, January 7, during the Sunday School hour. You will have the opportunity to engage in discussion and ask questions as we consider the topic of Lifetime Planning. Jennifer is a long-time member of First Pres Salisbury and has practiced law for over 30 years, with a concentration in Estate Planning.

Perhaps two questions just came to mind. Why an estate plan? And why is the church initiating this conversation?

Do you want to be in control of the distribution of your assets upon death, or let the state, (and therefore the laws of North Carolina) decide for you? Do you want to choose who administers your estate, or again, let the law determine who that will be? Estate planning allows you to be in control and make your own choices about the answers to these questions.

While First Pres hopes you remember the church as you consider the distribution of your assets upon death, the church's main priority is to



encourage this kind of planning order in to provide for your family's wellbeing when you can no longer do it in person, and that the person vou want to handle it is in place--to give you peace of mind while looking ahead.

You are never too young to do this kind of planning. Engaging in this process gives that wide-angle lens, enabling you to think about what's important, helping you focus on your goals, and be discerning about the impact you can have on your family, your church, your community, and the world.

While the need for a will is a primary component of planning for the future, it is also important to consider a financial power of attorney and health care power of attorney. Their titles are self-explanatory, but in each, you have the opportunity to designate who will make these kinds of decisions for you in the event you cannot.

I so look forward to further conversation about these important topics on Sunday, January 7 from 9:45-10:45 am in Fellowship Hall! Come prepared to learn something you did not know and with any questions you may have.



As part of our LPS on Sunday, Feb 4, Mr. Zahl will discuss his newest book: Low Anthropology: The Unlikely Key to a Gracious View of Others (and Yourself).
