Remembering Tim Waugh With A Special Service



On April 20, we will gather to worship God and entrust Tim into God's care. While this will be a time for First Presbyterian to grieve, it will also be a time for us to host many beyond our church who loved Tim.

Here are the following ways you can help us be hospitable as we host this funeral:

- 1. Welcome and guide new faces You are a warm and welcoming congregation. Let our visitors experience that warmth as they make their way to the funeral.
- 2. Come early This will prevent last-minute bottlenecks and shuttle service overwhelm.
- 3. Carpool The fewer cars around downtown that day, the better.
- 4. Take note of the parking plan. Fisher Street and Jackson Street will both be closed due to Earth Day Jam. The First Pres parking lot will open at 9:30 am only for those with limited mobility. The South State Bank parking lot will be reserved only for musicians playing in the service. Everyone else is encouraged to park in one of the following three places: 1. The St. John's Child Development Center parking lot, which includes the gravel area behind the building. 2. The Lower First Baptist Parking lot on the corner of Jackson and Council. 3. The First Baptist Parking Lot next to the old YMCA. All of these parking lots are easily walkable to the church; however, if needed, the two First Pres Vans will be providing shuttle service to each of these lots. See the parking map on the next page.

Look What God Has Done - Baccalaureate 2024

When I first arrived at First Pres there was a lot that was new. New town, new faces, new job, new house (for the first time), new everything. Chief among the new things was my hybrid title, "Co-Senior Youth Director." Or something like that. I had never been a senior pastor before. But more to the point, I'd never been a Youth Director before! I remember those first weeks of youth planning and youth events. I had no idea what I was doing. Fake it till you make it, they say. Well, I must've really made it because, in the beginning, I had to really fake it.

It's now been almost 6 years. In youth ministry, you're supposed to count your time in dog years. So,

I've been the youth pastor for...33 years! God has seen this youth ministry through a global health crisis and through the ups and downs of living life alongside young people. And it's not an easy time to be a young person. Their world is on fire. Political turmoil, the constant reminder of an ecological crisis, the moors of social media, and skyrocketing mental health issues.

What word does God have to speak to such a world? But if I had to sum up all of this time with our young people, the word I would use would not be crisis or turmoil or difficult; it would be "relationships."

You can be the best planner in the whole universe, but if you don't know how to build relationships, your youth ministry is going to have the same population as the North Pole—zero. Relationships take time to build, especially with youth. Trust is hard to gain and easy to lose. But at the end of the day, the biggest gift we have to give is our time.

It's hard to believe that the wonderful group of seniors graduating this year were 7th graders when I arrived. In case you don't remember, a lot of new things happen between 7th and 12th grade. I've watched them grow up before my very eyes; I've watched them grow in their faith, ask a mountain of questions, and become young adults.

On Sunday, May 19, we will celebrate this group of young people with our annual Baccalaureate service. This year, we're putting a new and exciting spin on things. We're going to do something that we all love to do at church—eat lots of food. Following worship at 11, we're going to celebrate our graduates and have a churchwide picnic in Lewis Hall.

I hope you'll be there to see all that God has done.

I am deeply appreciative of the elders and congregation of First Pres for embracing the concept of pastoral sabbaticals. The extended breaks that I have been able to take during my ministry have enabled renewal vital to sustaining a long-term pastorate. I am writing to update you on my plans to take a three-month sabbatical this Fall.

As with any sabbatical, the overall goal is spiritual, emotional, and physical renewal through rest, study, and adventure in order to reengage ministry with more "energy, intelligence, imagination, and love." However, the focus of this time away is to think about

retirement and plan the process of retiring.

Plans for this sabbatical began over a year ago and were approved by both the Personnel Committee as well as the session last June. We agree it

could benefit both the church and me to explore how to conclude a long-term pastorate in the most positive manner. I turn seventy in 2026 and will retire at the end of 2026, if not before. I want to be ready, and I want to leave the church ready to move on. To that end, I will be away August through October to explore how to do just that.

I will begin by attending the Board of annual retirement Pensions seminar at Montreat. Then, I will develop a plan based on their wisdom. I also plan to visit colleagues who have retired or are in the process in order to find out what worked for them. I have a reading list. I hope to travel and see family and friends, and yes, retirement locations. I will post things on Facebook; in case anyone wants to follow along. When I get back, I will share what I have learned with the church in as many ways as possible. Maybe we will even do a class about making the most of your retirement years. I am not there yet, but I can see it on the calendar and want us all to be ready. May God bless us all as we continue this journey together!

2 Cents a Meal Update

If you ever wondered where our "2 Cents a Meal" offering goes, here is the update for you. This is an excerpt from a recent Salem Presbytery Newsletter. Let me know if you have any questions.

"These pennies become nickels, dimes become dollars, and hundreds become thousands. Collectively, we can magnify our impact and serve more of our neighbors in need as the body of Christ than we can do individually. Thank you to the members of the Salem Hunger Committee who meet throughout the year, review grant applications biannually, and strategize about how to keep our

domestic and international partners serving food-insecure populations that need it.

Through their hard work and your generosity, the Salem Hunger Committee was able to grant" \$33,000 in their Spring 2024 cycle to a dozen projects



from Chatham County to Alamance to Reidsville. Last year's recipients included Rowan Helping Ministries and Meals on Wheels Rowan.

"Beyond just keeping our local neighbors fed, the Hunger Committee has allocated \$38,000 of its International funds to our partner, Sister to Sister in Kenya for 2024. This will feed 175 food-insecure elementary-age children daily. In the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Salem Presbytery has allocated \$20,000.00 of its international funds to feeding sites where 278 children that are 6 months to 6 years old receive meals three to four times weekly." Empowered by Salem Presbytery's vision of living out the Matthew 25 initiative, the Salem Hunger Committee believes we emulate Jesus and follow his directives when he says, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me."



Facilitate-Property Maintenance

Sanctuary Waterproofing Making Strong Progress

The major waterproofing project on our sanctuary building continues to progress very well and is on schedule for key components of the work. Beginning back on November 1, the contractor, R&L Glover Enterprises, under the supervision of Bryce Evans, has been excavating down some 20 feet all around the exterior of the church building to repair and replace waterproofing materials.

The waterproofing portion of the project is wrapping up on the parking lot side and should be completed by the first week of April. That will allow use of the sanctuary for two special events: a wedding and the memorial service for Tim Waugh on April 20. Two other aspects of the work will take longer to complete. Preformed concrete steps for the Courtyard entrance are due here in early April. The current steps will be removed with the area under the porch to be waterproofed as well. The work will begin after the April 20 memorial service and take about three weeks to complete. If all goes well, we should be able to occupy the sanctuary on a more permanent basis in mid-May.

The second longer term aspect of the project is delivery of matching brick, primarily for the steps and porch for the Fulton Street entrance, plus the reconstructed steps and elevated landing for the Innes Street entrance. The brick will not be manufactured and delivered until late summer delaying completion until approximately October. The final step of the project is landscaping all around the building.

The total budget for the extensive work is about \$580,000, which is being funded by our Church Maintenance Reserve fund. The project remains on budget, possibly a little below budget. The project is being monitored closely by our Facilitate Team leadership, our maintenance supervisor Archie Tucker and our architects, Ramsey and Burgin.

The Facilitate Team is grateful to our congregation and church staff for their patience during this lengthy process. It is a relatively short-term inconvenience, but the long-term benefits will ensure the integrity of our beloved sanctuary building for many years to come.

Continue The Conversation, RISE Participants Say

Bright stickers told the story. About 20 people came together at First Pres on March 12 to break bread and follow up on a January workshop they'd shared, Race: An In-depth Spiritual Examination (RISE).

Black and white, they came from churches across the community and shared where their passions lay in working toward racial justice. Then participants put green stickers beside the passions they agreed with most.

A swarm of green dots came together around "improving early childhood education." Also popular were "racial healing" and "seeing Black congregations survive and thrive." The stickers indicated considerable consensus in the group.

But the overriding message was the desire to continue the conversation, bring more people into the discussion, and build meaningful relationships. Then, go beyond talk and take action.

The group decided to meet every other month to carry out that mission and discern what actions to take.

Monica Green, an elder from Trinity Presbyterian Church, helped lead the discussion.

Debbie Collins, captain of the Race and Justice Ministry Team, outlined three change models. Solutions may not lie in big, dramatic action, she said, quoting historian and author Jemar Tisby, but in "small, consistent acts of courage."

The January RISE Workshop was held at Hood Seminary and was sponsored by First Pres, Trinity Presbyterian, Soldiers Memorial AME Zion, Salem Presbytery, and Racial Equity Rowan. Nine people from First Pres were among the 31 participants. The Race and Justice Ministry Team supported the RISE Workshop and organized the March 12 reunion meeting.

The January workshop highlighted the biblical emphasis on equality, from God's creation of mankind in his image in Genesis, through Revelation's gathering of the multitude "from every nation, tribe, people, and language."

RISE attendees were also reminded of Paul's directive from Romans 12:2 — "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind."
